The Forum is made up of a small team of coordinators and a large group of volunteer members who are passionate about reducing Earth-warming emissions in our region. This initiative is open to everyone.

We share important information about climate change and promote the joys of low emissions living here in this beautiful region of Aotearoa New Zealand. We're all about creating a flourishing and ecologically balanced future for everyone.



How do we make change? We act - We inspire - We engage with leadership

Our calendar is full of events and activities for community building and climate action in Nelson and Tasman. We believe a future with low emissions is also a future with strong communities, lots of walking and cycling, creativity, camaraderie and plenty of good times.

But more than that:

 We organise a hugely popular annual Climate Action Festival, which runs over 10 days with more than 30 events 2. We support member-run projects and activities such as monthly repair cafes, bush restoration, film and discussion evenings, storytelling events, earth celebration parties and more.

3. We are raising awareness of the joys of climate action in a Take The Jump Kia Māia Te Peke campaign, which has received nationwide coverage.

4. Our members write submissions, speak to government committees and collaborate closely with our regional councils.



OUR IMPACT IN 2024

This year was exceptional on many fronts. This includes running our most successful and well-attended Climate Action Festival to date, growing the number of repair cafés regionally, hosting community gatherings and resilience events, coordinating a record number of evidence-based submissions to Government, both local and national, and a nationwide billboard promotion for the Take The Jump climate action campaign.

This all speaks to the strength of our large volunteer base which has only grown stronger in today's challenging political environment.

The 2024 Climate Action Festival brought our community together around 34 hands-on events, creating an opportunity to learn, exchange, act, and strengthen ties around our climate concerns. There were many avenues for action, from active travel to more sustainable fashion, from how to compost our waste to how to think more effectively about urban planning and building, and from growing our own food to thinking about regional micro-forests and large scale regenerative agriculture.

A number of community organisations partnered with us to create this week of events showing the strength of working together and the power of collaboration.

We are very grateful to all of our partners and the many volunteers who contributed to making the festival a success. Together, we're stronger.

AN EMPOWERING TAKE THE JUMP CAMPAIGN

The Jump is a climate action campaign that empowers people to try seven shifts that science says individuals can make to have the largest impact on decreasing carbon emissions.

The campaign is bright, positive, and about community and inclusivity. It is a joyous, people-led movement, making real change possible and is one of our fastest growing projects since its beginning in 2023.

This year we were happy to count:

- 2 new rounds of Ambassador training, leading to a total of 75 Ambassadors, roughly half located in Nelson/Tasman and half in the rest of Aotearoa helping us spread the word.
- A vibrant and edgy billboard campaign designed and run by the VML agency out of Wellington, helping us to raise awareness and gather more people around the Campaign.
- An increase in visits on the Take the Jump website, containing the 7 shifts and their packed-with-info "How to Guides", adapted to our New Zealand context.
- Several outreach activities and connections (Solstice Party, Pechakucha) as well as several TTJ specific webinars (see our Youtube chanel here and here).

3 THRIVING REPAIR CAFES

Repair Cafes allow members of the public to receive help with repairing used items, reducing waste to landfill and learning new skills together.

The Forum can now count 3 Repair Cafe in action, run by their members, as well as supporting volunteers.

Nelson and Motueka Repair Cafe are run monthly while the Mohua Repair Cafe runs once every 2 months.



Snowden's Bush Restoration

There are 12 people who regularly volunteer at the Reserve, some from the Climate Forum and some from 'The Friends of Snowden's Bush'. This year, around 700 plants were added to the Reserve. Trees were planted by various volunteers including students from the local Brightwater School and Pinegrove Kindy, members of the public attending a Mitre 10 Mega Helping Hands working bee, and people from the Climate Forum and Friends of Snowden's Bush. There are regular weeding working bees and the team is gradually improving infrastructure facilities at the Reserve.



INFLUENCING DECISION MAKING AT THE LOCAL AND NATIONAL GOVERNMENT LEVEL WITH OVER 10 SUBMISSIONS

This year, Forum volunteers have been very active on submissions.

EMISSIONS TARGETS AND POLICY

On emissions targets

A Forum group continues to work towards providing the rate of annual decrease in GHG emissions that is needed by our region to provide some probability of keeping us below 1.5 degrees of heating.

The group's process has been scientifically rigorous and quality tested with numerous groups including councils and climate change commission staff.


